



Aboriginal Education has a strong history at Glossop High School. Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander students at our school are well supported and expected to achieve their best. Australia's first Aboriginal Rhodes Scholar Rebecca Richards studied and completed her schooling at Glossop. Over recent years we have had many Dame Roma Mitchell Scholarship Award winners, which demonstrates that our students are on pathways to success in education and employment when they complete school.

During middle school Aboriginal students are given many opportunities to transition from primary school and connect with their culture. The annual Aboriginal STEM congress gives students a chance to learn about future careers in STEM, whilst also connecting with our students in a culturally safe space. Additionally, SAASTA Connect encourages students to undertake learning about their culture, language and history.



At senior campus each Thursday our students have the opportunity to be involved in the Riverland SAASTA program (South Australian Aboriginal Secondary Training Academy). This program empowers students to achieve their best in education, health and employment. Our academy has been voted state-wide SAASTA Academy of the Year in 2015 and 2019, as well as being Aboriginal Power Cup Champions in 2019 and SAASTA Shield Winners in 2016.

Furthermore our students across both campuses are heavily involved in Reconciliation Week and NAIDOC Week activities and improving cultural awareness amongst all students.
